# MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING HARFORD COMMUNITY COLLEGE & TOWSON UNIVERSITY September 28, 2021

#### PSYCHOLOGY B.S. Degree

Harford Community College, Bel Air, Maryland, and Towson University, agree to follow the articulation of courses outlined in the articulation (course equivalency) document, for completion of requirements for the Bachelor of Science degree in Psychology (Attachment A), which is attached to, and incorporated by reference into, this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). The following principles guide the operation of this MOU, with the requirements for transfer in specific curricula set forth in Attachment A.

- 1. Towson University will accept a maximum number of 64 credits from Harford Community College as outlined in the Attachment A. The number of transferable credits specific to this program is reflected in Attachment A.
- 2. Students who have completed the Associate of Arts Degree in the Psychology program at Harford Community College may transfer into Towson University's Psychology program with junior standing provided that the student has completed all courses identified on Attachment A with a cumulative GPA of 2.00 or higher. Courses completed at Harford Community College with 300 or 400 level Towson University course equivalencies will transfer as lower-level credit but will satisfy course content as indicated.
- 3. Only courses in which a grade of C (2.00) or better is earned will apply toward the major at Towson University.
- 4. In accordance with the MHEC transfer policy pertaining to general education requirements, Towson University will accept the completion of Harford Community College's general education requirements (GenEds) and students will be required to complete courses at Towson University to satisfy the remaining **Core Curriculum** requirements as shown in Attachment A.
- Towson University recognizes college-level experiential learning gained through previous work, military and/or volunteer service or life experience. Credit for prior learning may also be established through course challenge or standardized credit by examination.
- 6. Harford Community College students transferring to Towson University will be given every consideration for financial aid and will be eligible to compete for academic scholarships upon entrance to Towson University subject to stated scholarship deadlines.

- Both Harford Community College and Towson University agree to work together to facilitate the transfer of students from Harford Community College to Towson University to work cooperatively to insure the high quality of the programs at the respective institutions. Transfer of students will be in accordance with policies and procedures of both institutions, as they may be amended from time to time.
- 8. This MOU will be in effect initially for ten years, beginning fall 2021, with a review every two years by both parties. Any revisions the parties deem necessary must be evidenced in writing and signed by the authorized officials of each institution. The MOU may be terminated by either party for due cause and after adequate notice of not less than six months is given to the other party.
- 9. Towson University will establish procedures to provide information on the academic progress of Harford Community College students enrolled as part of this MOU.
- This MOU, when signed, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties and supersedes all prior agreements and understandings between the parties respecting the matter hereof.

# 2+2 Articulation Agreement for Harford Community College and Towson University

### Section 1: Course Completion Plan for Harford Community College

This section outlines the courses to take for the Harford Community College general education and program requirements in order to complete both HCC and TU degrees within a total of 4 years and 120 credits. The following tables do not include any nontransferable or prerequisite coursework outside of the curriculum.

Students may transfer a maximum of 64 credits. If students do not adhere to the courses outlined above in Tables 1 and 2, they are not guaranteed completion of the bachelor's degree in 2 years. Refer to section 2 for specific course details and transfer planning information.

#### Section 2: HCC Course Selection & Transfer Details

This section explains any specific course selections made in section 1 and provides transfer planning guidance specific to this degree plan. Students must follow the course selections outlined in this document. If students do not complete any or all of the courses outlined in this agreement, they will be required to complete outstanding requirements at TU.

#### **GENERAL EDUCATION**

• Mathematics Elective (GM): Must earn a C or better. MATH 216 Introduction to Statistics is recommended (but not required) to satisfy Mathematics General Education at HCC and Core 3 at TU. MATH 216 transfers as MATH 231 Basic Statistics.

- Arts/Humanities Elective (GH): An Ethics course is recommended to satisfy Arts & Humanities or General Education Electives at HCC and Core 14 at TU. Choose from PHIL 205 Ethics, PHIL 220 Bioethics, PHIL 221 Business Ethics. (PHIL 255 Environmental Ethics will also satisfy TU's Core requirement but will NOT satisfy General Education at HCC.) Students who transfer with PHIL 205, PHIL 220, PHIL 221 or PHIL 255 will not be required to take Core 14 at TU as listed in Section 3.
- Biological/Physical Lab Science Elective (GL): BIO 100 Fundamentals of Biology or BIO 120 General Biology I is recommended
  to satisfy Biological/Physical Science Lab General Education requirement at HCC and Core 7 at TU.

The following information explains the transfer of students' general education courses:

- TU will recognize the courses in Table 1 (see section 1) as a completed general education program. Students will receive a
  core package that satisfies most of the TU Core Curriculum without the need for course-by-course placement in specific
  Core Curriculum requirements.
- Students entering TU under this agreement will need to complete two Core Curriculum requirements at TU: Advanced Writing Seminar (Core 9) and Ethical Issues and Perspectives (Core 14). Students transferring with an Ethics course as indicated above will not be required to take Core 14 at TU provided they complete 37 units of General Education at HCC. Students who do not complete the associate's degree before transferring to TU or who do not complete 37 units of general education as specified in this agreement may be required to take additional Core Courses at TU.

#### PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS

Students may wish to substitute ENG 102 English Composition and Literature for ENG 109 English Composition: Research Writing. To request this substitution, contact your academic advisor at HCC. TU will accept either ENG 109 or ENG 102. ENG 102 will transfer as ENGL TLL.

#### PROGRAM ELECTIVES

Students must take the following courses in order to also satisfy required courses in the major at TU:

- Psychology Elective: Take PSY 209 Social Psychology to satisfy the major requirement (Foundation Course) of PSYC 225 (Introduction to Social Psychology). This course will also apply to TU's Core Curriculum.
- Psychology Elective: Take PSY 214 Human Development Across the Lifespan to satisfy the major requirement (Foundation Course) of PSYC 203 (Human Development).
- Psychology Elective: Take PSY 204 Abnormal Psychology to satisfy the major requirement (Foundation Course) of PSYC 261 (Introduction to Abnormal Psychology). Students considering the Clinical Psychology Area of Focus Option at TU (main campus only) must earn a B or better in this course.
- Psychology Elective: Take any psychology course of interest to satisfy an elective for the major at TU. Students considering
  the Clinical Psychology Area of Focus Option at TU (main campus only) should take PSY 212 The Helping Relationship at
  HCC to satisfy this remaining psychology elective.
- General Electives: SOC 102 Social Problems and CIS 102 Introduction to Information Sciences are recommended.

**Note:** Students should complete TU's three foundation courses: 1) Social Psychology 2) Human Development 3) Abnormal Psychology before transferring to TU as listed above. Please note that these courses are not offered at TU's TUNE campus. Students who transfer to TUNE without these courses will be required to take them at TU's main campus or will need to take them at HCC during their first semester of enrollment. A Transfer Petition Form is required to take courses at HCC after transfer.

## Section 3: Degree Requirements to Be Completed at TU

This section outlines the degree requirements for students transferring into the Psychology major at TU. Refer to section 4 for additional major requirements, recommendations, and university-wide degree requirements.

### CORE CURRICULUM REQUIREMENT: 6 UNITS

Core 9 Advanced Writing Seminar (This will be satisfied by PSYC 313 or PSYC 314 in the major.)

Core 14 Ethical Issues and Perspectives (Students transferring with PHIL 205 Ethics, PHIL 220 Bioethics, PHIL 221 Business Ethics or PHIL 255 Environmental Ethics will not be required to take Core 14 at TU.)

### **MAJOR REQUIRED COURSES: 8 UNITS**

Select one of the following for 8 units:

- PSYC 212 Behavioral Statistics AND PSYC 314 Research Methods in Psychology (Core 9)
- PSYC 213 Research Design and Statistical Analysis in Psychology I AND PSYC 313 Research Design and Statistical Analysis in Psychology II (Core 9). Note: PSYC 213 (offered only in the Fall) and PSYC 313 (offered only in the Spring) represent a two-course sequence that must be taken with the same faculty member in the same academic year. In order to receive credit for PSYC 213, students must complete PSYC 313.

### **MAJOR FOUNDATION COURSES: 3 UNITS**

PSYC 285 Biological Psychology (3 units)

#### MAJOR SOCIOCULTURAL AWARENESS REQUIREMENT: 3 UNITS

Select one of the following for 3 units:

- PSYC 432 Cross-Cultural Psychology (3 units)
- PSYC 441 Psychology of the Black Experience (3 units)
- PSYC 447 Sex Differences: Psychological Perspectives (3 units)

### **MAJOR ELECTIVES: 15 UNITS**

Select 15 units of other psychology (PSYC) courses (excluding PSYC 325, PSYC 361, PSYC 383, and PSYC 465). All 15 units must be upper (300-400) level. A maximum of 6 units can be experiential classes which include PSYC 381, PSYC 391, PSYC 433, PSYC 435, PSYC 454, PSYC 491, PSYC 494 and PSYC 499.

#### **GENERAL ELECTIVES: 28 UNITS**

The total number of elective units required will be determined by the total units completed within the major and the Core Curriculum. Electives can be additional major electives or courses for personal interests. Students may also consider one of the options below.

#### ADDITIONAL OPTIONS IN PSYCHOLOGY

The Department of Psychology offers undergraduates two options beyond the completion of the general undergraduate concentration: a Clinical Psychology Area of Focus and an Honors Thesis in Psychology option. Admission to each of these options is competitive; for full consideration, applications must be made to the appropriate program director by the third week in October of the student's junior year.

Please note that the Clinical Psychology Area of Focus and the Honors Thesis in Psychology options are offered at TU's main campus only. These options are not available at TUNE.

#### Clinical Psychology Area of Focus Option

The Clinical Psychology Area of Focus offers more extensive training in Clinical Psychology beyond that gained by completion of the Psychology major. The area of focus provides a three-term course sequence (14 units), beginning in the spring term of the junior year. Courses are organized around practicum experience with extensive supervision so that there is continuity between theory and practice of clinical skills.

For a student to be admitted to the Clinical Psychology Area of Focus, the following criteria must be met by the spring term of the junior year:

- Completion of PSYC 205 Introduction to the Helping Relationship (PSY 212 The Helping Relationship at HCC) and PSYC 261
  Introduction to Abnormal Psychology (PSY 204 Abnormal Psychology at HCC) with a grade of "B" (3.00) or better in both
  courses
- 2. A minimum cumulative GPA of 3.40 and a Psychology GPA of 3.60
- 3. Submission of a writing sample, a letter of recommendation from a TU faculty member (preferably from Psychology) or employer who has observed the applicant's interpersonal skills, maturity and professionalism, and an interview with the program director to determine the student's sultability to complete the Clinical Psychology Area of Focus

### **CLINICAL AREA OF FOCUS REQUIREMENTS: 14 UNITS**

- PSYC 431 Group Dynamics (3 units) taken spring of junior year
- PSYC 439 The Initial Interview (3 units) taken spring of junior year
- PSYC 454 Internship in Psychotherapy (4 units) taken fall of senior year

PSYC 454 Internship in Psychotherapy (4 units) – taken spring of senior year

#### Honors Thesis in Psychology Option

The honors thesis option provides students the opportunity to learn in-depth about the research process in psychology. Students complete an independent thesis in close collaboration with a faculty mentor, while taking a series of advanced courses on research methods, data analysis, thesis preparation and professional presentation. The three-term program (11 units) culminates in the student's senior year with the completion of the thesis and presentation of the findings in a symposium format. The honors thesis option begins during the spring term of the student's junior year and continues throughout the student's senior year.

For a student to be admitted to the Honors Thesis in Psychology option, the following criteria must be met by the spring term of the junior year:

- 1. Completion of PSYC 212/PSYC 213 and PSYC 313/PSYC 314 with a "B" grade or better
- 2. A minimum cumulative GPA of 3.40 and a Psychology GPA of 3.60
- 3. Identification of a Psychology faculty member who will supervise the thesis
- 4. Submission of a personal statement and writing sample and interview with the program director

Departmental honors will be posted to the transcript shortly after the bachelor's degree is conferred.

## HONORS THESIS OPTION REQUIREMENTS: 12 UNITS

- PSYC 486 Advanced Experimental Design (3 units) taken spring of junior year
- PSYC 497 Honors Seminar in Psychology (3 units) taken fall of senior year
- PSYC 498 Honors Capstone Psychology (3 units) taken spring of senior year
- PSYC 499 Honors Senior Thesis in Psychology (3 units) taken spring of senior year

Section 4: Additional Requirements & Recommendations for TU Degree Completion

# BACHELOR'S DEGREE REQUIREMENTS FOR ALL STUDENTS:

- A C (2.0) or higher is required in all major courses and prerequisites.
- A cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.0 is required.
- 32 units of the bachelor's degree must be completed at the upper level (courses numbered 300 or above).
